We did not do all the things we desired, but our four years have been full and happy. This was due to the guidance and efforts of our lovable teachers who have have worked hard that we might complete our high school training.



SECTION THREE






The purpose of this organization is to develop leadership through cooperation, thrift, civics, scholarship and intelligent choice of farming vocation.


The Club has planned many social activities for the school year. The Mother and Daughter Banquet promises to be the most outstanding.
