



What is a Doula?

A Birth Sister (doula) is a **trained professional** who provides continuous physical, emotional and informational support to a mother before, during and shortly after childbirth to help her achieve the healthiest, most satisfying experience possible.

What is a Community Based Doula?

A "community-based doula" often has **shared lived experiences** and is trained to provide extended, **culturally congruent support** to families throughout pregnancy to include antepartum, intrapartum, during labor and birth, and **up to one year postpartum**. Community-based doulas provide an **expanded set of services** and play a crucial role in improving outcomes and experiences for **communities most affected by discrimination and disparities in health outcomes**.







Doulas Improve Outcomes

Expectant mothers matched with a doula had better birth outcomes.


Doula-assisted mothers were

- 4 times less likely to have a low birth weight (LBW) baby,
- 2 times less likely to experience a birth complication involving themselves or their baby, and
- significantly more likely to initiate breastfeeding.

Communication with and encouragement from a doula throughout the pregnancy may have increased the mother's self-efficacy regarding her ability to impact her own pregnancy outcomes.

Who We Are

To dismantle root causes of systemic racial maternal health disparities for Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) while denying race as a risk factor.





Why We Were Formed

"Studies show that significant racial disparities (differences) in birth outcomes continue to exist even after accounting for factors like the pregnant person's income, education, marital status, tobacco/alcohol use, and insurance coverage. Researchers have proposed that African Americans are subjected to individual, institutional, and other forms of racism throughout their lives; these experiences build on each other and are uniquely stressful; and the increased stress can negatively impact pregnancy outcomes (Giscombé and Lobel, 2005). "


Local Disparities

 Black women are more than twice as likely to die from a pregnancy-related cause than white women in Virginia.

 In the Blue Ridge Health District, the average infant mortality rate for black babies was 9.5 (per 1000 live births) compared to 4.5 for white women from 2015 to 2019.






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Our Numbers

- Over 65 BIPOC women and families served since 2020
- 75% of clients are Medicaid Eligible
- 0% Maternal Mortality
- 0% Infant Mortality
- 2 Infants w/Low Birth Weight
- 2 Preterm Births




