



Authoring FAQs

Q: Does OER creation require a high-tech solution?

A: Not at all. OER can be as simple as a shared document.

Q: What about copyright and Creative Commons (CC) licenses?

A: Licensing is foundational for all OER work. A license that allows the 5 Rs is ideal.

Q: Can multimedia be OER?

A: Yes, but there are considerations around adaptability and storage.

Q: What if I'm not ready to start from scratch?

A: Let's talk about adapting content...

Reasons for Adaptation

Address a particular teaching style or learning preference.

Add material contributed/suggested by students.

Adjust for different learning level/course level.

Correct errors or inaccuracies or update with new information.

Address diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility.

Add media or links to other resources.

Considerations for Adapting Material

About the <u>original</u> source:


- What's the file format of the source material?
- How much content needs to be changed?
- What license is attached?
- Is the material accessible?




About your resources & plans:

- How comfortable are you with the technology?
- Do you have the tools needed to edit the source material?
- Do you understand and are you comfortable with the CC license?
- Where do you plan to publish your final adaptation?
- Is the material accessible?
